ace

An ace is a playing card, often with the highest point value. *With the points from one more ace, I can win the card game.*



achieve

Achieve means to complete, win, or make real. When she sells the last shirt, she will achieve her goal of selling all the shirts.

advantage²⁰

If someone has an advantage, that person has a better chance to succeed than someone else has. *Amy has the advantage in the race because she is the fastest runner*.

applied

Applied means you gave a company your name and work history to show that you want to be hired for a job. *I really need a summer job, so I applied at every store in the mall.*

certain

Certain means sure or positive. *I am certain that I will pass the test because I studied very hard this week.*

chef¹⁹

A chef is a person who cooks for other people, often at a restaurant. *Many people liked the food that the chef cooked, so his restaurant was always busy.*



employer¹⁸

An employer is the person or company that pays you to do a job. *My employer tells me which jobs I should work on and when I need to finish them.*

history²

History is the study of people and events in the past. *In our history class, we studied how America became a country.*

opponents²

Opponents are the people who are against you in a contest or competition. Seeing my opponents before a game always makes me nervous.

position²⁶

A position is the way someone or something is placed compared to others. *The tallest basketball player was in a good position to score a lot of points.*

quiz show²³

A quiz show is a kind of television program in which people win prizes by answering questions about history and other topics. *She won a new car by answering the most questions correctly on a quiz show.*

sleeve²²

A sleeve is the part of a shirt that covers an arm. *The sleeve was longer than his arm, so it covered his hand.*



spelling bee¹²

A spelling bee is a contest in which people try to say the letters of a word in the correct order. *I* studied the dictionary to get ready for the spelling bee.



studying²

Studying means trying to learn about something. *The students* were studying by reading in the library.



sure

If you are sure, you know what you are thinking is true or right. *I am sure that we need to fill our bottles with water before we walk five miles to the park.*

worried¹⁷

Worried means feeling afraid that something bad will happen. Jan was worried that she would be in trouble because she was late for school.
